# Thy Word is a Lamp unto my Feet

On the occasion of a tour through the campus of Harvard university with a group of classical high school students, a remarkable exchange occurred. Our tour guide, a young psych major at Harvard, had brought us through the cruciform shaped main hall, replete with Latin quotes and references to the great sacrifices of Americans from the wars of Revolution through the Civil War



and beyond. The interest of the students in these inscriptions was answered by our guide with a disregard for a "dead language." When we finally ended our inspection of the place at a monument to the founding of the university and John Harvard, a dissenting minister of the Massachusetts Bay Colony, we were told that this was all a sham. Our guide denied that Harvard had anything to do with the original purpose of the school as a seminary. On the same plinth our students saw the famous three books of the Harvard seal, with the Latin word *veritas*. Having just explained that all details of the founding of the school were lies, our guide was irritated with our students who exclaimed in unified amazement, translating the word on the memorial as 'truth'! The cultivated ironic attitude of the modern Ivy Leaguer jangles with the older purpose of education. Our guide disappeared without a farewell, like a conjured imp.

Because human beings are born into a state of utter dependency and helplessness, fathers and mothers must educate their children. This unavoidable activity of education has been rationalized by many great minds in the past. Is it in order to form more perfect citizens? Is it to ensure that great minds arise in order to lead future generations? Is it to advance the human race and its domination of nature? Melanchthon, Reformation scholar and companion of Luther, in On the Role of Schools (1543) used the metaphor of the lamp in order to help us understand the necessity of education so that able minds may converse upon and sustain the position of the Word of God among us. He explained that the state, civilization, is like a lamp, and the Word is the Light itself that comes from that lamp. Without the Light, the lamp is a ridiculous dead weight to be held aloft in darkness. Without a lamp, the Light is not housed, protected, and lifted up in order to allow safe travel in darkness. Schools are necessary, and their connection with the Word imperative. The family vocation of education makes the vocation of the state effective so that the Word in the vocation of the Church may be held aloft, illuminating our conversation with each other and God. The early American Puritans understood this, and so did the Lutheran immigrants to America, fleeing the pointless domination of a dark lamp, the rationalist totalitarian state in Germany in the age of reason. How ironic indeed that this movement in Europe came to be called die Aufklarung, "the Enlightenment" that culminated in the banishment of God from creation and his creatures, casting a long and violent shadow over subsequent centuries.

As the educational project stumbles in our own time, it is clear that without a vision, the people perish. Our vision must be Christ, who alone has the words of life.
