# FROM THE DESK OF THE HEADMASTER

You have been given a vocation and gift; parenting and children, who like many arrows

in the quiver are useful and pleasant for the growing of families and help in time of trouble. Education is the mandate of God for the children of man. We all come into the world helpless and naked. The pattern for us all is to come before God and his creation in deep need of everything. This is the way God would have it. It is a reminder that we all continue in this way no matter how may blessings we receive and that we rely on God alone and his provision through Jesus Christ.



The question then is potential. Do we not want our children to develop their potential as God's own children? Many educators in the postmodern world believe that this potential is largely economic and personal. That children must be integrated into the workforce and learn to advocate for equity because of some vague concept of the basic dignity of man. That man is evolving into a new global consciousness and has grown beyond the selfish concerns of family and the superstitions of the Church. This is a catechism of despair. We know that man's potential is found in the Son of Man, who is the essence of virtue and wisdom, spoken of by the prophets and born in the line of Abraham. When we cast children back upon themselves, telling them that they deserve to be anything they want to become, we have denied them the path of wisdom and righteousness upon which they travel toward fulfillment. The children of the Church are not of the world, and more and more these days the difference in education, catechism, desire, and rationale becomes clearer and clearer.

In years gone by, a good American education was not necessarily counter to the teachings of the Church. Nowadays, you should probably spend a good deal of time, should you send your children to a public high school, deprogramming them. In that environment they spend most of their waking hours surrounded by a doctrine of no spiritual insight. Sometimes, even a Christian education can be nothing more than a school that teaches the same priorities of economic utility first and wisdom last if at all, preserving the weak promise that there will be no talk of sexual perversity or filthy talk. This is good, but not good enough. Lutherans have a high view of the vocations, Church, Family, State. Lutherans have a high view of man.

In recent times, Lutheran parents have been responding to this cultural crisis which sees the vocation of the state usurping the vocation of the Church and family by providing classical Lutheran education alternatives for their high school age children. By learning the languages, children become eloquent. By studying logic, they begin to discern. By meditating on the maths, they grasp the harmonious creation. By studying history, the logic of the present. By regarding scripture above all thoughts, the revelation of day of the Lord.
