ANCIENT LETTERS



What do we mean when we understand something to be 'ancient'? One way to describe this concept of the ancient might be to say that things so far in the past have little resemblance to things that hold sway now. By their lying across some border, behind

some curtain or line that changes things, we remark upon them as far from us, or ancient. In our own times, this may be the time between the jet age and the information age, between a time that was known for rapid advances in air and space travel and a time that made much travel unnecessary as people began to communicate instantly more often on a 'web' of interconnected digital paths. The ways of doing things and understanding things changed remarkably. How much more so in the time of the ancients when compared to ours.

What changed? We see the ancient times as those that saw the invention of writing itself and opened the chapters of great questions concerning man and the cosmos, as well as speculation and prophecy concerning God. What is the border between then and now? For our purposes, and those of most of modernity, that barrier separating the world of thought and perception of the ancients and us is the coming of Christ. His proclamation of the Gospel began with "Repent, for the kingdom of God is at hand". How appropriate that the revelation of the Word Made Flesh should throw the assured world of the ancients on its head, causing a tear in the fabric of thought right through the accounting of the times, bringing about the distinction of BC and AD. Now, we could be said to live in the years of the reign of Christ awaiting his return, Anno Domini, the year of the Lord. Therefore, we call the time before the incarnation and ascension the time of the Ancients. We study ancient letters at Concordia Academy, marveling at the foretelling of our own times.
